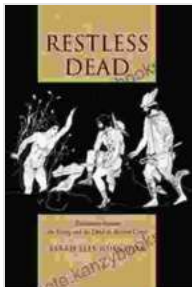


Encounters Between The Living And The Dead In Ancient Greece

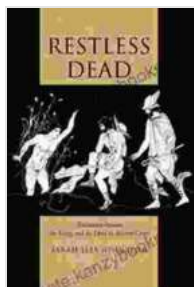
